### 1. Define Rāga in Indian Classical Music. Discuss its characteristics and significance in shaping musical expression.

**Solution:** A Rāga is a melodic framework in Indian Classical Music, consisting of a specific set of notes arranged in an ascending and descending scale. Each rāga conveys a particular mood or emotion, known as 'rasa'. The structure of a rāga permits improvisation while maintaining coherence within its defined parameters, allowing musicians to express their creativity while adhering to traditional rules. There are many types of rāgas classified by the number of notes used in their scales. Rāgas are fundamental to the practice of Indian classical music; they serve as the basis for compositions and performances, making mastery of them essential for any musician. For instance, 'Yaman', a popular evening rāga, embodies a romantic feel, showcasing how different rāgas resonate with specific feelings. Hence, understanding rāga is crucial for both performance and appreciation of Indian music.

### 2. Explain the concept of Tala in Indian Classical Music. How does it affect the structure of a musical performance?

**Solution:** Tāla is the rhythmic aspect of Indian classical music that organizes beats into cycles. It consists of various units called mātrās, which are grouped into vibhāgas or sections. Each tala has a specific number of beats and patterns, which artists must follow for maintaining rhythm during performances. For example, 'Teen Tāla' is composed of 16 beats grouped into four vibhāgas; this structure helps performers and listeners synchronize to the rhythm. The interplay between tala and rāga enhances the overall performance, creating a balanced musical experience. Musicians often improvise within the confines of tala, showcasing their skill while respecting rhythmic structures. Understanding tala is essential for any musician as it lays the foundation for timing, phrasing, and overall coherence within a piece.

### 3. Discuss the classification of Rāgas based on the number of notes used. Provide examples of Saṁpūrṇa, Śhāḍava, and Auḍava rāgas.

**Solution:** Rāgas are classified based on the number of notes they employ in their ārohaṇa (ascending scale) and avarohaṇa (descending scale). 'Saṁpūrṇa' rāgas utilize all seven notes. For instance, 'Alhaiyā Bilāval' and 'Yaman' are examples where the complete scale 'S R G M P D N' is used in both directions. 'Śhāḍava' rāgas have six notes in their scales, such as 'Gurjarī Todī' in Hindustani music, which omits one note. Lastly, 'Auḍava' rāgas feature five notes, like 'Bhūpālī'. This classification not only aids in studying rāgas but also enhances understanding of melodic progression and improvisation in performance. Each classification reflects different emotional expressions, influencing the choice of rāga based on the performance context.

## 4. What are achala-svara and chala-svara? Explain with appropriate examples.

**Solution:** Achala-svara refers to invariant musical notes that do not change pitch and stay constant, specifically 'S' (Śhaḍja) and 'P' (Pañchama). In contrast, chala-svara consists of notes that possess higher and lower variants, which are 'R' (Riṣhabha), 'G' (Gāndhāra), 'M' (Madhyama), 'D' (Dhaivata), and 'N' (Niṣhāda). For instance, 'R' may appear as a lower komala (flat) Riṣhabha or a higher śuddha (natural) Riṣhabha. This distinction is crucial for understanding how rāgas are constructed and how musicians employ these notes to evoke different emotions and express musical ideas. Understanding the role of these notes serves as a foundational skill in developing proficiency in Indian classical music.

## 5. Explain the historical contributions of Tānsen to Indian music. How did his legacy influence modern practices?

**Solution:** Tānsen, a renowned musician of the Mughal court, is celebrated for his exceptional mastery of rāgas and his immense contributions to Indian classical music. His legendary ability to invoke natural phenomena through music, such as bringing rain with 'Rāga Megha' or creating heat with 'Rāga Dīpaka', solidifies his status as a pivotal figure in music history. Tānsen's innovative improvisational techniques greatly influenced the Hindustani classical music tradition. His methods of classification and teaching styles served as a predecessor for modern music education. Musicians today still draw inspiration from his style and approach to performance, emphasizing improvisation within structured frameworks. His legacy, visible in various compositions and performances, has left an indelible mark on the evolution of Indian classical music, making him both a revered figure and an integral part of music pedagogy.

## 6. Describe the Melakartā system in Carnatic Music. How does it compare to the Hindustani thāt system?

**Solution:** The Melakartā system in Carnatic Music comprises 72 basic scales that utilize all seven svaras in both ascending and descending order. Each scale represents a unique combination of lower and higher variants of the chala-svaras, forming a structured approach to melodic creation. This system allows musicians to derive numerous janya (derived) rāgas from each janaka (parent) rāga, enhancing diversity in compositions. In contrast, the Hindustani thāt system classifies rāgas into ten categories based on the notes used, specifically outlining their potential based on which variants are employed. While both systems aim to provide a framework for musical compositions, the Melakartā system emphasizes a larger variety of scales, fostering a distinct approach to melody compared to the more limited yet deeper exploration of the thāt system. This systematic classification aids musicians in grounding their practice within a rich, historical context.
