Solution: Geographical factors include availability of water, landforms, climate, and soil fertility. For example, river valleys (water availability) such as the Nile attract high population densities due to agriculture and settlement. Urban areas grow due to economic opportunities, while climatic comfort encourages habitation, illustrating interactions between geography, economy, and social factors.

2. Evaluate the impact of migration on the population dynamics of urban areas. Discuss the push and pull factors influencing migration patterns.

Solution: Migration significantly alters urban demographics, leading to population growth, labor market changes, and potential cultural shifts. Push factors such as unemployment and conflict drive people away, while pull factors like job opportunities and better living standards attract them. For instance, cities like New York showcase diverse populations due to global migration trends.

3. Explain the stages of demographic transition theory with examples of countries in each stage. Discuss the implications of these stages on population policy.

Solution: Demographic transition theory outlines four stages: 1) Pre-industrial, with high birth and death rates (e.g., some African countries); 2) Transitional, where death rates fall but births remain high (e.g., India); 3) Industrial, where both rates drop (e.g., Brazil); and 4) Post-industrial, with low birth and death rates (e.g., Japan). These stages inform population policies on family planning and resource allocation.
